

MINOR WOUNDS IN HORSES... DO YOU NEED ANTIBIOTICS?

Superficial skin wounds or scrapes do not need antibiotic treatment! Instead, you should clean the wound with saline or clean water, and perhaps a mild wound soap.

Once the wound is clean and dry, apply a **non-adherent** (non-stick) dressing where possible.

Be cautious if you are using topical remedies on the wound, as many remedies can damage healing skin cells and slow healing. Topical remedies should also not be applied if a veterinarian is coming to evaluate the horse as they can limit treatment options (i.e. suturing).





HORSES WITH MINOR WOUNDS DO NOT REQUIRE ANTIBIOTICS

WHEN TO CALL A VETERINARIAN?

You should call any time you are worried, or unfamiliar with what to do.

For horses with wounds, call your veterinarian when you notice:

- Wound is bleeding excessively
- Wound is deeper than in the skin
- Wound is near the joint or tendon
- Horse is very lame or in pain
- Wound is not healing even with topical medication
- Wound has thick discharge, proud flesh, or is smelly


Your veterinarian may talk about whether a **tetanus vaccine** is needed for your horse.

HOW YOUR VETERINARIAN CAN HELP

Your veterinarian can perform a thorough physical exam on your horse and provide great advice on wound management and topical treatments. They may also perform **laboratory tests**, such as:

BACTERIAL CULTURES

- This is used to figure out which bacteria is causing the signs, along with information on the antibiotic resistance profile of the bacteria
- Guide appropriate treatment decisions, and
- It can help determine the best treatment options if a wound is not healing or seems infective
