Presentation at CAHLN


Presentation at CAHLN -The Canadian Animal Health Laboratorians Network (CAHLN) conference was held in June 2021. The conference theme was "One Health Perspectives on Emerging Disease and Antimicrobial Resistance", and it included many interesting presentations by laboratorians and epidemiologists across Canada. CAHSS coordinator Dr. Theresa Burns presented on behalf of co-authors Drs. Glen Duizer (MB Govt), Nathalie Bruneau (CFIA) and Doris Leung (CAHSS) on "Animal Health Informatics: Integrating Animal Health Information in Canada". She discussed the concept of generating surveillance datasets from Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS), provincial abattoir systems, and other data sources that can be used by laboratorians, pathologists, epidemiologists, and other personnel to easily generate information they need. Next steps include a visioning process with key partners, updating the recommended dataset for animal health laboratory data, and preparing for new data including genomic data.

Annual Review & Sustainability Planning Committee

At the June 2021 CAHSS Annual meeting, Dr. Glen Duizer (MB Govt) was nominated as the CAHSS steering group chair, and Dr. Ashley Whitehead (UCVM) was nominated as the CAHSS steering group vice-chair. There were also year in review updates from each CAHSS network, and from CEZD, CSHIN, WeCAHN, OAHN, RAIZO and AtCAHN. Annual Review presentation slide decks are available on the CAHSS portal site if CAHSS members would like to have a look. The second day of the meeting focused on the forward looking annual plan. The intention is to continue supporting the diverse projects of CAHSS network groups, CanSpotASF, CAHSS website, Animal Health Insights podcast, and other information products that are relevant to animal health and surveillance. One key focus area for this year is CAHSS Sustainability Planning. Animal Health Insights

Since the launch of our inaugural episode in December 2020, CAHSS has broadcasted 7 web-based podcast episodes with diverse topics that inform and engage producers, pet owners, laboratorians, and veterinarians on Canadian animal health and surveillance topics. Our podcast series has had around 400 all-time downloads. Our latest episode was released on July 14, 2021 and featured information on a cattle-adapted bacterial pathogen, *Salmonella Dublin*. NEW PROJECTS AROUND THE NETWORK

Our commodity group and topic-focused networks are going strong. A few highlights of network activities are provided below:

AMU/AMR Metrics and Indicators Tool


The CAHSS AMR/ AMU Backgrounder on Metrics and Indicators for Reporting AMU provides a recipe-like approach that partners can follow when planning AMU reporting in animals. The backgrounder and accompanying AMU reporting tool will allow the user to be able to better communicate with contacts within the animal production sector, other sectors engaged in antimicrobial surveillance, policy makers, and other key partners. CAHSS will initiate a pilot of the tool and to seek feedback and comments.





Dairy Network Update

The **Bulk Tank Milk report** was completed for this year and was presented to the network group. The CAHSS dairy network continues to remain actively engaged, with many jurisdictions providing updates on Salmonella Dublin, a disease of significance that seems to be on the rise across Canada. There is also a recent podcast released on CAHSS providing information on *Salmonella Dublin* etiology, biosecurity, disease management, and more with Dr. Simon Dufour.





Equine Disease Alerts & Other Updates

disease alerts (https://cahss.ca/cahss-Eauine tools/disease-alerts) have been updated and shared with members through the equine disease dashboard (https://bit.ly/3ygkpWC), especially of equine infectious anemia (EIA) cases. There is hope that increased information sharing will raise awareness of the importance and value of testing for EIA. EIA, EHV, and influenza were reported this quarter. CAHSS would like to acknowledge CFIA and provinces for their contribution and efforts in providing case information for disease alerts to the dashboard. In other equine-related news, the Potomac Horse Fever (PHF) webinar presented by Drs. Luis Arroyo and Ashley Whitehead on May 18, 2021 was met with tremendous success. Small Ruminant Network Update

The CAHSS Small Ruminant network group formed this year and has been actively engaged and share information in a cross-Canada roundtable on a quarterly basis. One of the priorities of the network group was to create a stakeholder surveillance map that connects partners from industry, veterinary associations, research groups, governmental agencies and more together in improving small ruminant animal health. The map is now live on our CAHSS page in French and English. The group aims to have other network priorities to discuss at the fall network meeting.





WDAI Projects Update

Dr. Danielle Julien, a research associate with One Health UCVM developed a framework to guide collaborative management of issues at the human-wildlife-domestic animal interface, and presented the framework to the NFAHWC WDA Interface working group and other key partners on June 8, 2021. The next step is to utilize the framework to solve real world problems with interface diseases. Moreover, CAHSS Communications Lead Dr. Doris Leung is currently working on generating an inventory for disease control and management strategies for high priority wildlife-domestic animal diseases in Canada. The report will be available this fall.



Launch of New Networks

CAHSS is currently evaluating the need for a **Companion Animal network**, and considering options to bolster surveillance information sharing for companion animals across regions and organizations. Council of Chief Veterinary Officers (CCVO)

Community for Emerging and Zoonotic Diseases (CEZD)

CEZD's website was launched as a microsite of the CAHSS website in the spring of 2021, since launch we have had almost 5000 page views on the site. We also now have a social media presence on Twitter, follow us at: https://twitter.com/CEZD_CMEZ. A small working group of CEZD members is collaborating to further engage with other One Health Networks across the country. The team is compiling an inventory of One Health networks and organizations, and will conduct outreach in the fall with those that have a focus on emerging and zoonotic diseases. We are continuing to work to enhance CEZD's capabilities to identify and direct early warning signals to those that need them. As a result, we are working on the creation of disciplines within the Knowledge Integration using Web Based Intelligence technology to direct signals via species and syndrome types.

Atlantic Canadian Animal Health Network (AtCAHN)

AtCAHN continues to meet regularly. These meetings allow members to bring forth disease trends and issues. Updates from each region of our network allow for quick notifications and possible action if any is required.

Ontario Animal Health Network (OAHN)

OAHN has had a busy spring and early summer, with the creation of multiple new communication products related to: An emerging fish parasite in Ontario; Ontario equine disease alerts; COVID-19 veterinary podcast; Bovine podcasts, and many more. As well, multiple research projects have been concluded and results posted, including: Development and validation of a PCR test for small ruminant lentiviruses (CAEV and MVV); Modelling potential hotspots of African Swine Fever in Ontario's wild pig population; Parasitism in grazing cattle in Ontario; Ongoing investigation of an outbreak of Senecavirus A; and Surveillance of post-mortem data from a livestock disposal site. OAHN will be searching for a new Coordinator after Dr. Barham resigned to assume the position of Executive Director NFAHWC (congratulations Melanie!).

Réseau d'alerte et d'information zoosanitaire (RAIZO)

Small-scale pig farming veterinary group: Launched in May 2021, this group promotes veterinary presence in small pig farms to improve pig health monitoring. Among other things, the group shares veterinary expertise and publishes an online directory of practising veterinarians interested in offering their services to this clientele in various parts of the province. PISAQ: A financial support program, the Quebec integrated animal health program is designed to prioritize actions that impact the structure of animal health and welfare and the wellbeing of the biofood sector. The program is implemented through campaigns, which include animal health visits. A number of these campaigns have been held since 2017. The most recent one, launched this spring (2021), targets fish farms. It focuses on the importance of biosecurity to prevent and control diseases in farmed fish. Western Canadian Animal Health Network (WeCAHN)

As WeCAHN enters its second year of operations, the steering committee is developing the Terms of Reference, and we are also developing guidelines for identifying and responding to surveillance signals.

The dairy network is pleased to welcome the Western Canadian Certified Hoof Trimmers Association to its group. The association will be sending a representative to WeCAHN network meetings for continued information sharing.

The beef network is currently prioritising outcomes of interest for reporting at meetings, with the help of the Western Canadian Bovine Practitioners' Association.


Frequently asked questions regarding practices such as vaccination, and common clinical presentations, from the swine and poultry listservs, are being converted to pagers and shared publicly via the WeCAHN website.

WeCAHN is launching a small ruminant network this fall and is currently recruiting and on-boarding veterinary practitioners from each of the western provinces to participate.

Forum 2021
