

Québec’s integrated animal health program (PISAQ) prioritizes actions that have an impact on animal health and well-being, and economic success of the agri-food sector. PISAQ campaigns are developed in cooperation with the program partners, which include producers and veterinarians.

A campaign is defined as a government initiative targeting the implementation of measures to sustainably improving practices to increase the health and well-being of farm animals. Campaigns include **animal-health** visits provided by veterinary practitioners and fully funded by the government.

Campaign 1 Prevention, diagnosis and control of abortion in small ruminants	Any sheep or goat farm with a ministerial identification number (MIN) and a minimum of 10 adult animals.	From April 1, 2018
Campaign 2 Collective control strategies for porcine respiratory and reproductive syndrome	This campaign is finished. Thank you to the participants.	From April 1, 2018 to March 31, 2019
Campaign 3 Importance of biosecurity in the fight against <i>Salmonella</i> Dublin in the dairy industry	All dairy cattle farms with a MIN and a minimum of 10 lactating cows	From April 1, 2018
Campaign 4 Optimisation of immune resistance in cow-calf operations	All cow-calf farms with a MIN and a minimum of five adult cows.	From December 1 2018
Campaign 5 Judicious use of antibiotics on hog farms	All hog farms with a MIN and at least 100 hogs or 25 sows.	From May 1, 2019
Campaign 6 Improving the quality of goat milk on goat farms	Coming.	Coming
Campaign 7 Integrated management of parasitism in small-ruminant farms	Any sheep or goat farm with a ministerial identification number (MIN) and a minimum of 10 adult animals and using or foreseeing the use of pastures.	From June 1, 2019
Campaign 8 Eradication of the PRRS virus on hog farms active in a control group	Farrowing unit, farrow to finish unit, or a continuous flow nursery or finisher site with at least 100 hogs or 25 sows. The farm must be active in a PRRS control group and involved in an eradication process.	From February 1, 2020
